THE MESSAGES TO THE SEVEN CHAPTERS, 2:1-3:22

***The Church of Smyrna***

**CHRIST COMMENDS THE CHURCH OF SMYNA FOR ENDURING TRIBULATION AND ENCOURAGES IT TO CONTINUE TO BE FAITHFUL IN ANTICIPATION OF IMMINENT, MORE SEVERE PERSECUTION, IN ORDER TO INHERIT ETERNAL LIFE AND HEAVENLY KINGSHIP (2:8-11)**

OUT OF SUFFERING

*“John predicted that the church in Smyrna would be persecuted (2:10). Pain is part of life, but it is never easy to suffer, regardless of the reason. Jesus commended the church at Smyrna for its faith in suffering. He then encouraged the believers that they did not need to fear the future – if they remained faithful. Don’t let difficult times turn you away from God. Remember that when you suffer, Christ*

*suffers with you because you belong to him (Philippians 3:10). Allow your suffering to draw you toward greater faithfulness. Trust God and remember your heavenly reward (see also 22:12-14). Out of suffering will come the crown of life."*

Smyrna is the only city that has continued to the present day, having the modern name Izmir. Another harbor city with a thriving export trade thirty-five miles north of Ephesus, it was renowned for its beauty and its civic pride, calling itself "the first in Asia" as well as the birthplace of Homer (disputed by other cities). It maintained an excellent relationship with Rome and was one of four cities (with Ephesus, Pergamum, and Sardis) to host the provincial assembly. Because of its long loyalty to Rome, it beat out ten other cities for the privilege of building a temple to the emperor Tiberias. In succeeding decades, it became a center of the imperial cult. Its architecture made it one of the most pleasing cities in Asia: famous temples (the temple of Zeus and Cybele were connected by a mall that was the envy of the ancient world), a group of buildings called "the crown of Smyrna," an acropolis on Mount Pagos, and a beautiful roadway called "the Street of Gold."

It had a large Jewish population that virulently opposed Christians. This may have been occasioned by the destruction of the temple and consequent anti-Jewish feeling in the Roman Empire. Christianity thus became a double threat, not only religious but political. It is common to theorize that the edict under Domitian demanding emperor worship made it easy to persecute Christians, and that the Jews were active in denouncing Christians to the authorities, possible to deflect attention from themselves. Rome had given the Jews the right to practice their religion, and they did not want this precious privilege threatened. In addition, in the 80s Judaism had excommunicated the Christian "heretics" from their synagogues, and they wanted nothing to do with them. In A.D. 155 the famous bishop of Smyrna, Polycarp, was burned alive for refusing to call Caesar "Lord" during an extensive persecution instigated by the Jews. The Smyrna church itself had been founded either by some returning Jewish traveler present at Pentecost or (more likely) during the Pauline mission of Acts 19.

**2:8:** And to the angel of the church in Smyrna write:

**2:10:** **Do not fear** what you are about to suffer.

μηδὲν φοβοῦ ἃ μέλλεις πάσχειν.

Behold, the devil is about to cast some of you into to prison

ἰδοὺ μέλλει βάλλειν ὁ διάβολος ἐξ ὑμῶν εἰς φυλακὴν

in order that **you might be tested** and you will have tribulation ten days.

ἵνα πειρασθῆτε καὶ ἔξετε θλίψιν ἡμερῶν δέκα.

**Be faithful until death**, and **I will give to you the crown of life**.

γίνου πιστὸς ἄχρι θανάτου, καὶ δώσω σοι τὸν στέφανον τῆς ζωῆς.

**2:11:** The one having ears, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches!

**The one overcoming** will never ever be hurt by the second death.
